Feedback on skin to skin issues

Feedback from a father supporting a mother said "I wanted to participate in skin to skin contact with my baby as my wife wasn't up to it but the Theatre scrubs wouldn't allow it"

Another said

"I felt vulnerable and exposed without a top on in Theatre"

A female birth partner from a same sex couple wanted to participate but "Theatre attire just wasn't suitable"

A suitable top would need to be

✓ Suitable for male and females
✓ Baby visible to mum and midwife
✓ Easy access opening
✓ Soft on baby's skin
✓ Disposable

✓ Inexpensive



We ordered a small supply and asked for feedback from our midwife colleagues and then trialled the jackets. The feedback was fantastic

I was unable to have skin to skin whilst still in theatre with my previous daughter 6 years ago due to feeling a bit light headed so she was wrapped in a blanket and held by her dad. When we were told about these new jackets would allow Calvin to have the

opportunity to have skin to skin with our baby we said yes straight away

Skin to Skin benefits

- Fathers become more caring and sensitive towards their infants (India) and talk more to them (Sweden).
- Fathers become more engaged at home after the birth (Colombia, Denmark, Sweden).
- The father's relationship with the mother improves (USA, Sweden).
