BACKGROUND



Trust wanted to acknowledge the patients death with NOK and prepare for receiving bereavement survey Many complaints around lack of support, patients property handed back to them falling out of bags or given in a plastic laundry bag

There was nothing in local area for bereaved relatives unless linked into local hospice or GP where there are long waiting lists for counselling We were receiving no official feedback from relatives or carers regarding experiences around death and dying



PROCESS



Mourning Coffee Once a month in Havering, Barking and Dagenham and Redbridge



Condolence Cards sent out following a death, introducing the Bereavement survey and offering the opportunity to have a meeting with Chaplains or Palliative Care Team Leader Bereavement surveys now sent out 12 weeks following death instead of 6-8 weeks
