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Curriculum

- Protection: Communicable diseases, immunisation, infectious agents, and vectors of disease; and environmental health hazards and hygiene
- •Prevention: Mental well-being; and taking care of your body
- •Improvement: Wider determinants of health; and safe relationships
- **Project:** The end project is self/locally determined and must demonstrate learning of one or more of the learning outcomes and include a peer-to-peer learning component

- •Initial report delivered in May 2023

- Widely accepted by children and young people
- •Described as informal and flexible, with autonomy
- Potential wider impact for increased healthrelated knowledge
