

The Snowdrop appeal and the bereavement spaces refurbishment

Snowdrop team



Snowdrop team was created in March 2023 and officially launched in June 2023.

Since then, we have increased our hours and expanded our team.

We have cared for 387 families in total.

This works on out on average a referral to our team every 1.5 days.

We support families across Gynaecology, Maternity and the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.



A total of £43, 500 was raised for the Snowdrop appeal

Parents and families continue to raise money to further improve our spaces and service.

The end of the appeal linked in with Baby Loss Awareness Week where the charity lit up the skies above St Michael's in memory of all babies who have died.

JC Decaux also changed all their screens in the centre of Bristol to a single candle for the Wave of Light at 7pm on the 15th October.

We gave her cuddles, took photos and made some memories. We are so glad to have been able to do this." (Parents of a baby delivered following a miscarriage).

"It feels that we can support parents better now by giving them options to stay in a quiet and comforting area. We have the space to do memory making with them and for the Doctors to come have conversations with them." (Staff member).
