The By Your Side Project - What we do:

Having a child in hospital can be overwhelmingly stressful for parent carers. As well as emotional strain, families often face a raft of practical challenges and left feeling confused by the medical system and unsure where to turn for help. They can also struggle under increased financial pressure as they reduce work hours to spend more time with their child.

Parent Feedback, BCH, anonymous:

Having a child is hospital is really isolating, especially a bay. I felt like my expectations, hope and life had been thrown against a wall. It was good that the contact Lady reached out with a smile. At first, I didn't want to talk. Hospital is like a bubble. I'm tired and I really care about anyone else. The contact Advisor asked me questions that really struck a chord! What was I most looking forward to once my baby and I left the hospital? I dint know. I wanted to go to a baby group but couldn't face other parents' questions. What was wrong with my baby? Why wasn't she sitting up or doing something typical? The Contact lady was able to use her local knowledge to suggest some groups to me where all the babies might have some kind of disability or delay. These were a godsend to me.

I now volunteer with Contact, as part of Laura's team, to make a difference to other families because time and services may have moved on, but the sense of isolation and powerlessness hasn't changed. With Contact, I felt supported, and the communication was effective.







DinoDay Challenge, annual 19th June:

The inspiration behind the DinoDay Challenge is Cameron Mathieson. Cameron had both Cystic Fibrosis and Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy and sadly passed away when he was five years old after spending over two years in hospital.

At that time, children who spent over 12 weeks in hospital lost their Disability Living Allowance (DLA). Here at Contact, we supported the Mathieson family's legal challenge to this unfair rule. With our support, the family won their case at the Supreme Court and since then, no other family with a child who spends long periods in hospital has been denied this essential financial support.

Cameron, who was born on 19 June, loved dinosaurs – or as he called them, Dowsers. His favourite Dowser was Troy, a green triceratops! The money also helps us campaign to tackle the inequalities that families with disabled children face, like we did for Cameron Mathieson's family and thousands of others since.
